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## Conference Welcome

Dear friends and colleagues,

We are delighted to welcome delegates to Glasgow to the Adam Smith Business School, University of Glasgow for the 49<sup>th</sup> AIB-UKI Conference, 13 – 15 April 2023.

The conference theme this year is “International Business and SDG 8 – Are we on course?”. The Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 8 aims to promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all. The twelve associated targets call for action in a number of interconnected domains that are of great relevance for global governance, international business, and international entrepreneurship. However, the Covid-19 pandemic and geopolitical issues such as war, the climate crisis and associated humanitarian catastrophes highlight just how fragile progress towards inclusive and sustainable growth is. German Chancellor Olaf Scholz called the February 24 invasion of Ukraine a “Zeitenwende” (a revolution) and in face of external shocks we witness local communities and small firm actors hit hard. Global disruptions in supply chains and an increase in national protectionism prompts question whether global value chains should be shortened and re-localised to reduce risks. The increased need for government support for small and medium enterprises shifts the ground on which support was traditionally provided. Restrictions to travel and in person communication prompt businesses to take advantage of digital technologies to ensure business continuity. Disruptions to peace and the weakening of democratic systems raises questions around the responsibility of local and foreign business actors in these regions. Mass migrations, be it forced or voluntary, raise questions around integration mechanisms in host countries including integration into the labour market and through encouraging entrepreneurship. We thus aim to provide a scholarly platform to interrogate the complex relationship between international business (IB) and society, in particular around SDG 8.

There are many heart-felt thanks due to contributors that enable this conference to be held. We would like to thank our keynote speaker Prof Rob Van Tulder, and pre conference workshop hosts Editorial DEsk Reviews (ELDERs) Paper Development Workshop organising team, as well as all the wonderful journal editors and paper mentors, and AIB Sustainability SIG for the pre-conference career development workshop.

We are grateful to the outgoing Doctoral Colloquium Convenor Professor Surender Munjal, and the reviewers and participants. This is such an important part of the conference and your input is very much appreciated. May we also thank Prof Ulf Anderson who is standing down from the AIB UKI executive after many years of unstinting service.

We would like to thank all of the participants and delegates that are so vital to enable the conference: track chairs, panel session chairs and members, editors of journals, reviewers, authors and presenters.

Special thanks to the Glasgow team; Conference co-chairs, Dr Neomi Sinkovics, Prof Rudolf Sinkovics, Prof Mehdi Boussebaa, and our conference team led by Caralin Montgomery-Cichy, Lauren Nagle and Amy Love.

## Provision of meals during conference

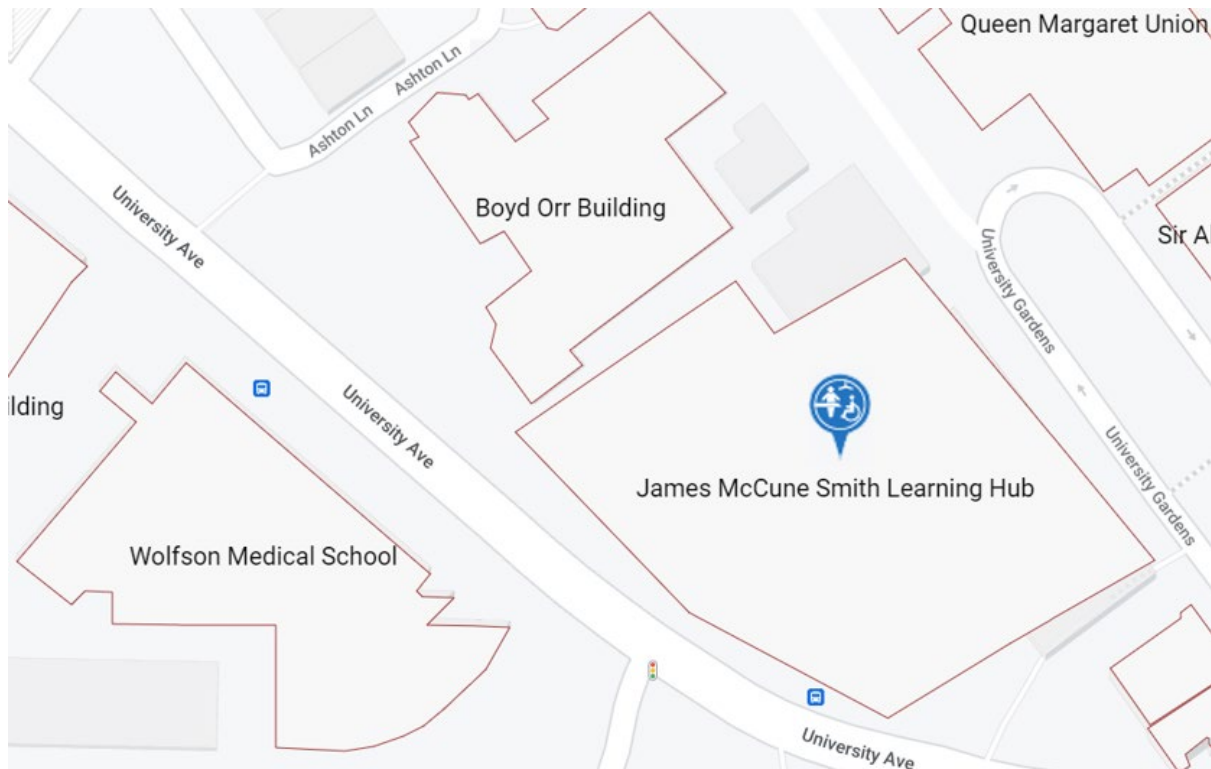
